It is tournament time in Northwest Ohio (and Northeast Ohio for some). Welcome to Trail Trash and the Swami for our thirty-second year. Thank you to our loyal (and not so loyal) readers. Your support is greatly appreciated.

Let me cut to the chase. I really dislike the expansion to seven divisions. Too many divisions. Division I is too small with just sixty-four teams. In the Central District, Lancaster (seeded seventeenth out of twenty-two teams) is in a district final without playing a game. Limiting Division II to sixty-four teams probably makes the least amount of sense in a poorly thought-out proposal. Ridiculous. 128 teams in D1 with six divisions would have made much more sense. Why isn't D2 in football limited to a smaller number of teams similar to how D1 is handled? Why is it just a basketball issue? Who influenced that decision? Please do not tell me that seven is reasonable because football has seven divisions. Apples and oranges. More schools have basketball plus every team gets to participate in the tournament, so why not just go to eight or twelve divisions. Regardless of the number of divisions and how they are divided, the reality is that somebody will always be the biggest and somebody will be the smallest. Will everybody be

happy? No. Is it fair? No. But to implode something that worked is asinine.

I understand that more teams will get the opportunity to participate at the regional or state level. The downside with such a significant increase from four to seven divisions is a watered-down product. IF there was really a need for expansion, do it gradually and get it right. And this was the best solution? At least it is not about the money. Or so we are told.

With just the championship games being played at the University of Dayton, the state finals will take place on Friday (3/21) and Saturday (3/22). The good news is there are no Sunday games. The fourteen state semifinal games will be played March 14-16 at sites to be determined. That includes four games on Sunday. Bummer. According to the OHSAA, the Executive Director will determine semi-final pairings after the regional championship games are completed to minimize travel. Where the

Nowhere else will you find the amount of information that we present on Davey1.com.

state semifinal games are held will be interesting. It very likely will include some of the venues that are being used for the regional tournaments. What also will be interesting is the kind of vibe in the arenas. Will it feel like a state tournament game or another regional game? I would guess the latter. We will still have a final four for each division but that is in name only. With the state semifinal games being played all over the place, we will not have a state tournament. That is gone.

With the additional week added in for the state semifinals, the regular season was shortened a week for those schools not in D1 or D2. It did not help that the football playoffs concluded on their latest date ever, December 7. Excellent planning by our friends in Columbus. Throw in some winter weather and a large number of teams will be unable to get in a full twenty-two game schedule. There will be a handful of regular season games played during the first week of the tournament around Northwest Ohio. The majority will involve D1 and D2 teams.

With the beloved MaxPreps RPI now being used for the seeding process, the time has come in Northwest Ohio to seed all teams in each division rather than by the individual district. This will result in more travel for tournament games, but that is already happening with the elimination of neutral sites for sectional games, the increase in the number of divisions, and shipping the D1 schools to the Northeast District. Make it happen NWDAB.

In looking at the brackets, we will still have 80 sectional games in Northwest Ohio. That is down from 107 in 2024. With the increase in the number of divisions, sectional championships become a meaningless statistic. There are no sectional games in either D1 or D2.

In conference news, Liberty-Benton will be joining the Northern Lakes League for the '26-'27 school year as part of the NLL's Cardinal Division. LB had already announced plans to leave the Blanchard Valley Conference at the end of the '25-'26 school year, and the addition will give the NLL six teams in each of its divisions. There are more conference changes on the horizon (when was the last time we didn't say that?) with news on changes in the Sandusky Bay Conference and Northern 10 coming very soon.

The Ohio Prep Sports Media Association Poll aka the AP Poll never made an appearance this basketball season. There were only eleven voters on the final poll in 2024 so it was probably time.

Time to break out the ouija board and go to the picks.

DIVISION I

Whitmer and Perrysburg have been assigned to the Northeast District. The Northeast District is not using neutral sites for district semifinal games with the higher seed hosting. The two Lakewood district winners will join the two district winners from Akron North for the regional at Kent State. Cleveland St. Ignatius is the overall top seed.

LAKEWOOD DISTRICT: Cleveland St Ignatius is the top seed. Perrysburg is the #6 seed out of seventeen teams and hosts a district semifinal game. Perrysburg starts four sophomores. If #9 Cleveland Heights had not jumped on the bracket, would it have been Whitmer? Perrysburg and Whitmer split a pair of close games with the game at Perrysburg ending with 19.7 seconds remaining after a melee. Perrysburg and Whitmer both have just one loss in the NLL Buckeye.

AKRON NORTH DISTRICT: Brunswick, Strongsville, and Massillon Jackson are the top seeds. Whitmer is the #10 seed and will make the short 145-mile trip to Mentor. Win and make the 141-mile trip to Akron. Whitmer has three starters back from their 2024 state semifinal team including Antione West Jr (Purdue) and Makhi Leach (Bowling Green). The Panthers have faced a challenging schedule while dealing with a series of injuries, illness, suspensions, and dismissals. Will this Whitmer team finally gel in the tournament?

DIVISION II

The D2 district winners will travel to Elida (long road trip for Lima Senior) for the regional where they will face the two winners from the Southwest District. Cincinnati Winton Woods is the top team in the district that will meet the Fostoria winner while Kings Mill Kings appears to be the top team from the district set to face the Lake winner.

TOLEDO CENTRAL CATHOLIC DISTRICT: #3 St. John's Jesuit and #4 Toledo St. Francis are the top seeds. SJJ and St Francis finished in the bottom half of the eight-team Catholic High School League out of Detroit. The league features three of the five top teams in D1 in Michigan. Findlay had their first losing season since '98-'99.

FOSTORIA DISTRICT: #1 Lima Senior and #2 Anthony Wayne are the top seeds. Lima Senior returned three starters and their top sub along with two players returning from injuries including Jekel Cotton (Detroit Mercy). Throw in transfer Willie Foster from LCC and it is not surprising that Lima is one of the top D2 teams in Ohio. The Spartans won the Toledo City League championship knocking off Start. Lima's only losses were at Whitmer and at Lima Shawnee. Kind of surprised Anthony Wayne went this route.

DIVISION III

District winners in D3 will go to the regional at the University of Toledo with the Liberty-Benton and Lake winners in one semifinal and the Willard and North Royalton winners in the other. Lutheran West is the top seed at North Royalton and the overall #3 seed in the Northeast District. An overconfident Lutheran West team headed west a year ago and met their match falling to Shelby in a regional final.

LIBERTY-BENTON DISTRICT: Lima Shawnee and Defiance are the top seeds at LB. In fact, they were the only two teams above .500 at the draw. Shawnee is the WBL champion. Shawnee's only losses were in overtime to LCC back in November and at Delphos St. John's. The Indians recently beat Lima Senior by double digits. Shawnee rallied late to beat Defiance in overtime in their regular season meeting.

Southview is the NLL Cardinal champion going undefeated in division play. Rogers has a win at Southview.

WILLARD DISTRICT: Lexington and Mansfield Senior are the top seeds. Lexington won a 3rd straight OCC championship while Sandusky captured a 4th straight SBC Lake title. Sandusky has a win over Lexington, Mansfield Senior has a win over Sandusky, and Lexington swept its two games with the Tygers. The Minutemen, like Lima Shawnee, passed on the bye that would've taken them to the district semifinals. Should be an entertaining district.

DIVISION IV

The regional tournament will be held at Bowling Green's Stroh Center. The Findlay district winner will play the North Ridgeville district winner while the Clay district winner will play one of the district champions from Otterbein University. Youngstown Ursuline is the top seed at North Ridgeville and the overall #3 seed in the Northeast District. Jonathan Alder, Heath, and London are the top seeds on the bracket at Westerville. D4 in Northwest Ohio is not overly strong.

FINDLAY DISTRICT: Elida and Upper Sandusky are the top seeds at Findlay. Elida finished in the runner-up spot in the WBL losing only to Shawnee. Shelby returned one starter and the top sub from their 2024 D2 state semifinalist while Ottawa-Glandorf returned one starter from their 2024 D3 state semifinalist. OG will finish the regular season with a losing record for the first time in twenty years.

Bellevue and #4 seed Clyde went over to Otsego's side of the bracket and away from #3 Perkins. Bellevue swept their two games with Perkins. Brayden Olson became Clyde's career scoring leader breaking the record previously held by Lucas Messer.

DIVISION V

District winners will head to the regional at Mansfield Senior where they will meet the district winners from Mount Vernon Nazarene. Undefeated Columbus Academy is the top team from the district that will meet the Lakota winner while Columbus Africentric and Columbus Bishop Ready are the top teams from the district set to face the Napoleon winner. Northwest Ohio teams will have their work cut out

NAPOLEON DISTRICT: Tinora and Swanton are the top seeds. This district is a real crapshoot with several teams having a legitimate shot at winning the title. Tinora and Paulding share the GMC crown with Wayne Trace each with one conference loss. At the start of the season, I would have predicted either #8 seed Liberty Center or #9 seed Emmanuel Christian (assuming Nate Miles wins his appeal) as the eventual district champion.

The Polar Bears won their first eighteen games before losing to Canton Central Catholic. Liberty-Benton is the BVC champion losing only to Perrysburg and Patrick Henry. Genoa was edged out for the NBC title with the loss to Otsego in overtime. Liberty-Benton handled Genoa easily back in December but expect a much closer contest when they meet in the tournament.

The regional tournament will be held at Bowling Green State University. The Wapakoneta district winner will head south for a regional semifinal at Vandalia Butler. Troy Christian and Miami Valley Christian are the top teams in the district that will face the Wapak winner. That regional final will be played at Wright State.

DEFIANCE DISTRICT: Patrick Henry and Evergreen are the top seeds. Patrick Henry finished undefeated in the regular season for the first time since the '72-'73 team went 18-0. PH is one of four undefeated teams (D3 Miami Trace, D4 Columbus Academy, and D7 Russia are the others) in the state heading into the tournament. The Patriots won their first outright NWOAL title since 2007.

TC and OH split regular season overtime games. Karter Koester became Toledo Christian's career scoring leader in early January. Koester has scored over 1,500 career points.

All three teams seeded above Grove are from the Northwest Conference. #5 seed Wayne Trace was part of a three-way tie at the top of the GMC.

The Blackbirds beat the Locomotives, the Locomotives beat the Bombers, and the Bombers beat the Blackbirds. There are no better nicknames in Northwest Ohio. Maybe. Might want to throw in Stockaders, Whippets, and Truckers.

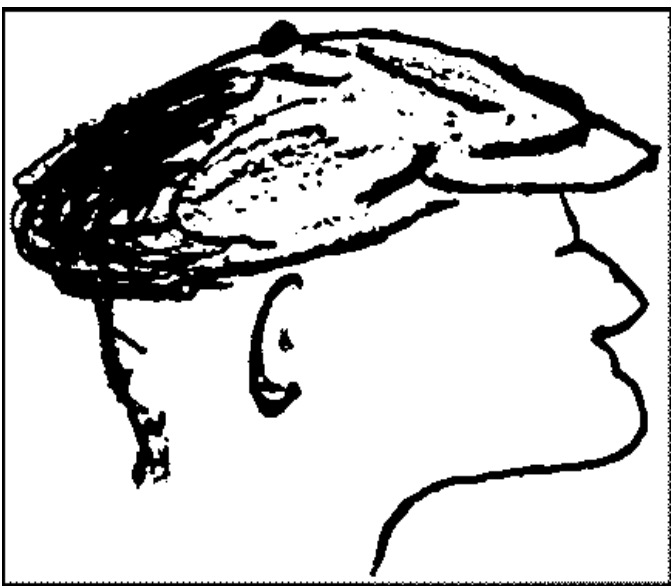

THE HISTORY OF DAVEYL.COM

During the summer of 2004 Dave Spengler and Dave Sigler sat down and talked about wanting to do something to promote boys high school basketball in Northwest Ohio. At first we didn't know exactly what we wanted to do, but since we were both fans of the game we knew that we wanted to do something. Then we decided to do schedules and scores, and create a website, Daveyl.com, where they could be found. But how many? Should we do just one league, or a group of leagues? We decided on an ambitious project to include all schools in the Northwest District of the Ohio High School Athletic Association. For those unfamiliar, today that's approximately 170 teams. It was quite an undertaking.

Every season Dave and Dave work closely together to keep our schedules and game scores accurate and up-to-date. During the 2018-2019 season our database included 2,075 games involving Northwest Ohio teams, and we provided a score for each of those games. More than one person is required to keep all of this information organized and complete.

In the early days there was much more work involved to obtain the schedules we needed. Dave Spengler would contact the schools by sending a letter, sometimes through the postal service and sometimes via fax, to each school (head coach or athletic director) to get their boys varsity basketball schedule. Each year the response rate increased, and more recently we're able to find some of the schedules we need on the web. However, every year, in September we send out e-mail requests to all head coaches requesting that they submit their schedule directly to us. Many respond, yet some still do not. We still persist and somehow find every schedule we need.

When the first schedules were published (2004-2005 season), for Northwest Ohio on Davey1.com, there was a schedule of games for each school, arranged alphabetically by league, and the name of the school. That's all you got.

During the 2006-2007 season we added team nicknames, and we also added a notation so that you would know whether a game had overtime periods. That may sound simple, but in the early years there was no way to know whether overtime periods happened or not.

Then in 2007-2008 we added to each schedule the OHSAA Division that each school competed in (1 through 4). That gives the fans information about the relative size of each school. In another section of the site is the enrollment numbers for each school that the Ohio High School Athletic Association uses to determine these divisions.

Another addition to the information we provide occurred **during the 2008-2009 season** when the name of the head coach was added to each schedule. But we weren't done yet.

The 2009-2010 season included the addition of the Sectional Site where each team would play their first OHSAA tournament game. Because of changes made by the OHSAA to their tournament drawing procedure this was changed to the District Tournament Site during the **2014-2015 season**.

One of Dave Spengler's favorite additions, that he **developed just before the 2010-2011 season**, was the addition of hyperlinks for each teams opponents so that you could easily switch schedules just by clicking on the opponents name. You would then jump immediately to that schedule.

At the **beginning of the 2012-2013 season we enhanced our listing of League Standings** so that they are ordered in the proper way to see which team finished at the top of their respective league. Another major improvement.

As each season has come and gone we have kept all of our schedules archived so that they can be viewed all the way back to the 2004-2005 season, creating an extensive history for each school. We believe there is no other single place where our readers can find this kind of information presented for each team.

One of the popular features found on the website is Trail Trash. It is The Swami's commentary and predictions for the OHSAA boys basketball tournament in Northwest Ohio. The first edition includes predictions for the Sectional and District Tournament, and the second edition includes The Swami's commentary and predictions for the Regional Tournaments throughout all of Ohio and the State Basketball Tournament. It is known that the Trail Trash has been used by coaches to motivate their teams when the Swami has chosen them to lose a tournament game....

Issues of the Trail Trash on the website go back as far as 2000.
